## **WHAT IS SMALL GROUP MINISTRY?**

There is a bit of a buzz in the parish about small group ministry, often also called fellowship groups or covenant groups, and the possibility of such an endeavor beginning here.

Let me tell you what I know about this model for spiritual development and church growth, and suggest why I think it is something worthwhile for King's Chapel to consider.

Generally speaking, churches with a small group ministry program have several groups of 8-10 people that meet at least monthly. Groups meet in homes or at church, usually for 90 minutes. Following a structured format, the groups encourage reflection, honest sharing, and respectful listening to each other's thoughts and experiences. Over time, people get to know one another in ways they cannot at social hours or committee meetings or at worship. People's spiritual lives deepen, and their sense of connection to each other and to the church grows. It is a great way for new members to get to know others in the church, and it is also a way for hard-working lay leaders to get something back, to have a chance to just be a member of the group, entitled to be supported and nourished.

Four members of King's Chapel attended a full day training on small groups in January, sponsored by the Mass Bay District of the UUA. These four - Lee, Ruth, Carolyn, and Cynthia - are open to questions from you about the training and the model's applicability to King's Chapel. They later met with Joanne Giannino, Assistant Minister, Sylvia, Senior Warden, and me in February to discuss possible next steps. The result of that discussion is an opportunity for anyone interested in learning more about fellowship groups (as we thought they are best called at KC) to come to an introductory session after church on April 13, from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the Parish House. Here, a brief description of the model will be presented, with handouts, and you will have a chance to participate in a fellowship group. A light lunch will be offered at 12:30 p.m.

Small groups are an investment of time for members and ministers both. A decision to go forward should be thought through. Earl Holt supports the congregation exploring this endeavor. And exploring is what those of you who come on April 13<sup>th</sup> will be doing, exploring for yourself and thinking with others if this is something that makes sense for King's Chapel at this time. Please let me or Joanne Giannino know if you can join us on April 13<sup>th</sup>.

Well, it is my first year at King's Chapel, and April 27 will be my first Annual Meeting with you all. Who else will be participating for the first time?

King's Chapel is a unique place. "Unitarian in theology, anglican in liturgy, and, congregational in polity." That means, like the other 1,000 or so member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association, that we are self-supporting and self-governing. When I was first a member of my home Unitarian Universalist church, I was excited about participating in a democratically run congregation. We, the members, decide everything! After a while, I felt the responsibility of that privilege. We, the members, must show up and talk about and vote and compromise and work together for the good of the entire congregation. At one point, I felt as if it would be easier to return to a denomination where the decisions were made for me. That urge only lasted a moment, though.

It is a privilege and an honor, and yes, a responsibility as a member of a congregation that is self-governing and self-supporting to participate in the decision-making conversations and meetings of the congregation. It is exciting and spiritually stretching. We can agree. We can covenant about how we will be with one another when we disagree. We learn and grow together.

This is the magic of congregational polity and congregational life: growth in the spirit made manifest in our relationships with one another in the congregation and then spilling over into all our relationships where we work and live.

Come to the Annual Meeting Hearing, Sunday April 20 after Morning Prayer at the Parish House, the week before the Annual Meeting. Enjoy lunch with fellow members, hear reports from committees, especially from the Restoration Committee, and the Finance Committee, ask questions, and make comments on the things that matter. There will be plenty of time for those attending Morning Prayer to get to the Parish House. Childcare will be provided.

Dear Members of King's Chapel,  
Greetings from the First Unitarian Church of Kolozsvár!

In January we analyzed our last year's activities, and I tried to visit the older members of our congregation. We also had a beautiful performance about the religious poetry of the 20<sup>th</sup> century Hungarian poets, which interested many of our members.

Our church confronts economic problems [with Unitarian church lands nationalized in 1948 and partially returned in recent years]. Because of title investigations and the bureaucracy, everything moves slowly!

We will hold our Annual Report on the last Sunday of March. One of the topics will be the Attic Project [which King's Chapel is helping to sponsor]. We assigned a planning office for this project and I hope City Hall will give us the authorization. For this we have to present a petition and a plan. In April and May I will visit, together with our dean minister, twenty-nine Unitarian congregations, and I have to write the reports.

We are looking forward to seeing our summer guests [the King's Chapel Habitat work group on Sunday, July 6<sup>th</sup>]. ... We will have our confirmation ceremony [and] this is a longer service, because our confirmands are asked from the catechism and they receive for the first time Communion. I hope this will not be boring for our guests!

Also praised was the high quality of preaching, both from Tricia and Joanne, as well as our distinguished guest preachers. But the best grade we could muster concerning Sunday attendance was an “incomplete,” noting that turnout is disappointingly below last year's numbers. What to do? An immediate, direct step agreed upon is for each of us to reach out to an absent member or two, to tell them they are missed, and to urge them to join us for the weekly “feast” that is prepared each Sunday at King's Chapel for all of us. Beyond that, we were encouraged by the energy and spirit of this informal feedback session to envision more such gatherings, small group conversations or “listening circles.” All in all, a productive event, suggesting that the state of our sabbatical is, on balance, quite good.

## VESTRY VIEWS

The '09 Budget for the operations of our church was presented to Vestry for comment at the last meeting. Judy, Chair of Fiscal Affairs, presided over what she characterized as a “non-event,” especially since Vestry voted unanimously to recommend passage of the budget to the Society. Through responsible counterpoise of desires and resources, the budget is both balanced and a reflection of the wishes of our various constituencies. As always, not everyone got all they requested, but Vestry felt the allocations were appropriate.

Fiscal Affairs is responsible directly to the Society, not through Vestry, to propose the annual budget. Thanks to Steve's remarkable reorganizing of our financial data into logical areas and to his presenting it over the year in ways that are understandable, and to Bill and the Trustees' working together since last spring, Vestry has been able to request a transparent, coordinated, balanced set of financial appropriations. Fiscal Affairs has been provided both good underlying data and clear desires expressed through the separate committees and with Vestry agreement.

Tricia Brennan, at her roughly half-way point as Sabbatical Minister, reported that things are going well and that she is pleased at the welcome she is receiving. She mentioned the picture which a Trustee has given to the Helen Keller Foundation, and which has received wide media coverage. She also reported that Suzanne Shea, author of *Sundays in America*, will be at King's Chapel on April 10<sup>th</sup> for a book reading and signing. There is a section about King's Chapel in the book.

The tidying up and cleaning of the church, and now, particularly the basement, an effort initiated by Beth and the Parish Council with Ollie of B&G providing remarkable assistance, is progressing well. Preliminary efforts are already producing great results.

There are envelope issues (our walls are leaking) at 63/64, and also on the South Wall of the church. Vestry approved unanimously B&G's requested appropriation and contract to point both walls, following the
