2010. It is hard to believe that we have started a whole new decade. Why, it seems that only the other day, we were entering a new millennium. But change does happen. Years and faces pass away; new occasions are born. The old saw was that the only kind of change that was evident at King's Chapel was spare change. Not completely true. When we are dealing with almost 325 years of church history (2011), the changes appear smaller and less significant against the wide sweep of time. And spare change, these days, is rarely spotted anywhere.

King's Chapel has experienced a lot of change over the centuries—from its transformation as a wooden church to its becoming the first Quincy granite building in the New World, from its use of its inherited Prayer Book from 1662 to its most recent printed revision in 1986, from its affiliation with the Anglican Church to its association with the then Christian American Unitarian Association and now Council of Christian Churches in the UUA, from its nadir in membership after Evacuation and the American Revolution to a zenith in the 1990's, from its not having a parish house to taking its fifth one at 64 Beacon for granted, from its long line of male leaders, ordained and lay, to having its first female Interim Senior Minister and its first female Senior Warden in Judy Green.

Still, the church has a long way to go, as do almost all churches during these challenging times. Among many other churches, memberships are flat. Money is tighter. The largest group joining churches identifies itself as Christian, but its members do not speak English. Others, who are interested in churches and English-speaking, are unchurched and do not much care about denominations. More so, we at King's Chapel need to remember that all churches have life cycles; what can follow a sad and trying period can be a joyful and purposeful one. Members need to keep their focus on the interim tasks and participate in the interim groups, which continue to be offered. Please, no spare change, but larger contributions. No change for change's sake, but greater commitment to our common future. In this New Year, let us all *be* the change.

I wonder if you could help me? I'm thinking about offering a class or workshop in the winter or early spring and would LOVE some input. Can I have a show of hands?

Well, I know I can't see your hands from here, but if you could, would you speak to me or shoot me an email if you have any interest in the following or have any other ideas for how we could spend some time together?

- Sunday afternoon discussions of three or four great Unitarian writings (e.g., Emerson's "Divinity School Address," Channing's "Unitarian Christianity").
- Sunday afternoon or evening series on Embodied Theology for Women (three or four sessions), with activities and discussions surrounding the feminine aspects of Christian theology and experience (e.g., In the beginning...a look at the oral history of our sacred stories. Who are the women in the Old and New Testaments, and what do we know of them in our own lives? What of our own experience informs our sense of "heaven on earth"?).
- Sunday afternoon series on different forms of prayer, exploring, for example, writing one's own prayers, movement prayers (like labyrinth walking or chanting), art making as prayer (perhaps altar or shrine making).
- On a Sunday afternoon or weekday evening, Poetry and Spirit, a series on one poet (e.g., Emily Dickinson) or several poets and themes of the spirit.
- A monthly evening meeting for parents of teens to share the joys and challenges of parenting a teen today.
- On a Sunday afternoon or weekday evening, a knitting circle, with projects to give to others in need (e.g., shawls for members who are ill, infant hats or sweaters for the Fragment Society).
- A one-shot chat on a burning question (e.g., How does one have a happy life? How do I know what to believe?).
- Something else?

I'd really like to offer something of interest at a time when folks would like to gather. So, if anything above sparks your interest let me know. If something else has been on your mind, let me know that, too. Together we grow and learn.

Because of the Christmas holiday, it was necessary to have material for this newsletter in before the December Vestry meeting on the 14th. Therefore, there will be no Vestry Views this month.

Highlights:

At the December meeting, Vestry will hear progress reports from its three study groups, concerning King's Chapel's Theology; Duties and Responsibilities; and Bylaws.

Peter Sexton will describe the Partner Church Committee's plan for a ministerial exchange between the church in Kolozsvar and King's Chapel. He will seek Vestry's approval for the Committee to raise funds for this exchange.

Vestry will take up the subject of the search for a third Trustee to fill the position left vacant by the death of Thaxter Spencer. Charles Perry will attend and will describe the last search process, when Gene Clapp was chosen. Vestry will discuss the criteria for the choice and will consider the names put forth by parishioners. Thanks to everyone who has made suggestions. Parish-wide participation in the process has broadened it and will deepen the sense of partnership between the Church and its Trustees.

✘ **A CHORAL CELEBRATION OF PSALMS**

On Sunday, January 24, the Concert Series presents a concert of a cappella settings of Psalms, from Orlando Gibbons to 2009, and in Latin, Hebrew, English, German, and even Estonian. Psalms — which, after all, are songs — have been set to music for hundreds, if not thousands, of years, and all over the world. There will be several new works: Christopher Hoh has written "Aromimcha Adonai Ki Dilitani" on a text from Psalm 30 for our choir; this will be its first performance. "Psalmus XXVII" by Yakov Gubanov, a professor at Berklee College of Music, written in 2005, will also have its first performance. And our friend Graham Gordon Ramsay has written a festive "Laudate Dominum" (Psalm 150) that will be heard for the first time at this concert. Other local composers include William Billings, who was around when King's Chapel was the newest building on the block!

The program will also include Orlando Gibbons's "Oh Clap Your Hands" (Ps. 47); Felix Mendelssohn's "Jauchzet dem Herrn"; Francis Poulenc's "Exultate Deo" (Ps. 81); James Woodman's "Psalm 139"; and "Still Waters" (Ps. 23) by James Granville Eakin III. The Rev. Joanne Giannino will further delight your hearts and minds with a few readings offering different perspectives on Psalms.

Parishioners and friends of King Chapel are cordially invited to an informal reception at the Parish House following the concert.
