Dear Friends,

To many people, Lent is a contrived time for putting on scratchy sack-cloth, bewailing our fates and toning down deep joy.

According to the First Evangelist, however, it is a forty-day period to both fast and to give-- with a certain degree of modesty. In Matthew 6:16-21, this year's traditional scripture for Ash Wednesday, we are asked not to flaunt what we do. We are invited to restrain ourselves from over-indulging--whether it be from well-known vices, such as smoking, drinking, or the lottery, or other less traditional ones, such as using plastic, face-booking or tweeting--*and* at the same time to give of ourselves, to give away our treasures, generously.

It seems to me these two moves-- of holding back and letting go-- suit our different personalities. For those who are naturally out-going and gregarious, learning to restrain ourselves, watching what we say or consume are crucial to understanding others and allowing them more space and greater respect. For those who are more withdrawn and introspective in temperament, cultivating greater generosity with words and actions along with gifts to charity is more significant.

The point is to choose a path, a method, a way, be it a *via negativa* or *via positiva*, if you will, and *not* just to stand there and do nothing during this preparatory period that leads to Easter. Say graces before meals, fast from chocolates, withhold from swearing and give up the soaps. Sing the Psalms, increase your pledges, draw the endangered species, lobby for the homeless, visit the Boston Food Bank and make a difference.

Jesus, we know, withdrew to the wilderness to overcome a series of tests and resist a variety of temptations. And when he was ready, only then, did he begin the journey to Jerusalem, preaching God's reign, ministering to those along the way, encouraging newcomers by example to join him, and accepting the responsibility of his obedience, compassion and courage in the face of human fickleness, cowardice and ineptitude.

May these forty days and nights be filled with holiness. May we discern which our best path is--be it restraint or generosity. And when a new season comes may we set forth with renewed confidence, energy and boldness-- to the fullness of God's love and righteousness.

*from THE ASSISTANT  
MINISTER*

Recently, members of the Staff and the Vestry/Wardens/Ministers, on separate occasions, took the Keirsey Bates Temperament Sorter, a personality test, to increase their self-understanding, to appreciate how others approach the world, and to grow in their capacity to work together in faith. Have you ever taken such a test? Once you finish this test and score it you end up with a personality type. Then the fun begins as you learn about the types, and compare/contrast with your committee or work mates.

There are sixteen types, which fit into four large categories: The Guardians, The Idealists, The Artisans, and The Rationals. They sound substantial, right? Just from the names do you have a sense of which would be you? Here are some general characteristics from the website [www.keirsey.com](http://www.keirsey.com):

Guardians are “the cornerstone of society, for they are the temperament given to serving and preserving our most important social institutions. Guardians have natural talent in managing goods and services—from supervision to maintenance and supply -- and they use all their skills to keep things running smoothly...”

Idealists are “passionately concerned with personal growth and development. Idealists strive to discover who they are and how they can become their best possible self ...and they want to help others make the journey.”

Artisans are “are the temperament with a natural ability to excel in any of the arts, not only the fine arts such as painting and sculpting, or the performing arts such as music, theater, and dance, but also the athletic, military, political, mechanical, and industrial arts, as well as the "art of the deal" in business...are most at home in the real world of solid objects that can be made and manipulated, and of real-life events...in the here and now.”

Rationals are “the problem solving temperament, particularly if the problem has to do with the many complex systems that make up the world around us...whatever systems fire their curiosity, Rationals will analyze them to understand how they work, so they can figure out how to make them work better.”

Might you get a glimpse of yourself in any of these?

People throughout the ages have sought to understand the variety of ways we are human. Personality tests provide one lens. In our recent group settings I have once again been fascinated and pleased at how differently others see and interact with the world; how differently their questions about life are; how differently they approach problems, etc. We need each other. All the ways we are, all the ways we see and act. That’s the beauty of our humanity and our challenge. We each have a part to play as we seek together to co-create the world most blessed.

**UPDATES, ANNOUNCEMENTS, & EVENTS**

**✦ RUSTY PARK NOMINATED TRUSTEE**

At the Annual Meeting this spring, the Trustees, Wardens, and Vestry will recommend to the Society that they vote to elect William “Rusty” Park as the third Trustee with an unlimited term. Our current Trustees, Gene Clapp and Sam Perry, welcome Rusty’s nomination as a strong colleague who will be instrumental in keeping – as the Indenture of 1907 says – “the maintenance of Christian worship at King’s Chapel.”

Rusty has been a member of King’s Chapel since 1982. He has served as Senior Warden and is currently co-chairing the Denominational Affairs Committee. He has been active in many aspects of church life. He is a Professor of Law at Boston University, specializing in international business transactions. Rusty was recently elected President of the London Court of International Arbitration, a significant honor. He grew up in Cohasset, where, he says, “he still gratefully resides when not abroad for hearings.”

The Vestry reviewed an initial list of 28 potential candidates and through successive votes developed a short list. The Senior Warden contacted those on the short list to determine whether they would be willing to serve. The names of those who indicated they would be available for nomination were sent to the Trustees, who noted the open character and seriousness of the nominating effort as well the quality of all the candidates submitted. Following an interview with each, and thoughtful deliberation, the Trustees returned the nomination of Rusty to serve with them. The Vestry approved their choice.

**VESTRY VIEWS**

The major item of business was to announce the current Trustees’ enthusiasm for the candidates presented by the Wardens and Vestry to fill the vacant Trustee position. Vestry formally voted to recommend to the Society that it approve the Trustees’ selection of a new third member (article elsewhere) at the Annual Meeting this spring.

The Vestry then voted to continue to pursue the realities of the Kirstein Library option for relocating our Parish House activities. It was noted that we are obliged by our church finances to explore every reasonable option for reducing the cost of operations and maintenance at 63/64 Beacon. Focusing on how we would use the Kirstein, or any other new building, could also provide an excellent medium for our Interim deliberations on who we want to become. N.B. Kirstein is not even officially available at this time, and should it become available, there are many questions to answer before we would be in a position to make this move.

As another option, it has been suggested that if we were to sell only 63 Beacon (the Parsonage) – this property does include the Little Chapel – we would then have the necessary funds to acquire and renovate the Kirstein. A later sale of 64 Beacon might then be put off until our move was complete and a better market presented itself, possibly leaving us with an endowment to maintain whatever parish house we would have. Such an endowment does not now exist.

The Annual Appeal is still in need of a strong hand to lead the effort and the generous support of all. While our current income may meet our current budget expenses, the Fiscal Affairs committee has a difficult task for the year ahead. Even with additional revenue from the Guide program, our overall net revenues are decreasing. Keeping our budget balanced for next year will require difficult choices.

**CONCERT SERIES**

**✦ CONCERT, MARCH 28: MUSIC FROM THE COURT OF CHRISTIAN IV**

Christian IV (reigned 1588-1648) of Denmark and Norway, was truly a "Great King." When not busy waging wars and running up the national deficit, he employed a vast array of musicians for the general delectation of his court. He established what you could term an international exchange program, inviting famous composers from England and the European continent to come serve at his court, and in turn sent promising Danish composers out into the world to study with some of the most famous teachers, notably Giovanni Gabrieli in Venice. This cultural exchange was instrumental (pun intended) in paving the way for an independent Scandinavian music culture.

For our final concert of the season, the King's Chapel Choir and Soloists will sing both sacred and secular works by the composers associated with Christian's court. Accompanied by Carol Lewis on viola da gamba and Olav Chris Henriksen on lute, the choir will sing motets by Heinrich Schütz, lute songs by John Dowland, Italian-style madrigals by several Danish composers, as well as excerpts of Schattenberg's *Jubilus S. Bernhardi*, and the Mass setting from Pederson's *Pratum Spirituale*.

The concert is on Palm Sunday, March 28, at 5 p.m. (Doors open at 4:30; admission is by a donation of \$15, or \$10 for seniors and students.) Please join us — and bring a friend! As always, parishioners and friends of King’s Chapel are invited to an informal reception at the Parish House following the concert.

### ✘ MA COALITION FOR THE HOMELESS

On February 25th eight members of King's Chapel attended Legislative Action Day at the State House. Included were *Charles Dietrick, Carol Genovese, Joanne Giannino, Bob Goodwin, Todd Lee, Amy Meyer, Kim Northrup, and Dianne Arakawa*. They joined representatives from other agencies, churches and denominations. This event was a follow-up to our Social Action Sunday on February 7th at which Sr. Linda Bessom preached at Morning Worship and spoke to us at a luncheon at the Parish House.

On this occasion Robyn Frost, the Executive Director, and Rep. Steven Walsh welcomed lobbyists, Mayor Tom Menino, Judy Meredith, the Executive Director of the Public Policy Institute, and Tina Brooks, Undersecretary of the MA Department of Housing and Community Development, spoke. In addition, panelists from Rediscovery in Waltham, the Worcester Teen Housing Task Force, Father Bill's/Mainspring House in Quincy, and DIAL/Self Youth and Community Services of Greenfield updated the audience on the current situation in the Commonwealth and answered questions. Due to unprecedented funding cuts, the needs of the homeless, especially youth from ages 18-24, have increased dramatically, and community action is vital.

Thanks to Art Judge and the entire Social Action Committee getting us to take action.

✂ CHURCH SCHOOL VISIT TO HALE HOUSE



*from THE CHURCH SCHOOL DIRECTOR*

In my February newsletter article, I mentioned that the Church School Committee was in the process of identifying several service projects that families could become involved in during the remainder of the Church School year. As I’m writing this, we have several projects in the works – a visit to Hale House on February 14th, a visit to the Greater Boston Food Bank on March 13th, and at least one more activity to be determined. As you’ll see on page two of this newsletter, all members of the congregation are invited to join us on our trip to the Greater Boston Food Bank (GBFB). So far, it’s looking like a majority of Church School families will be touring the GBFB facility, and I’m so grateful that families (and hopefully others from the church as well) are willing to get up early on a Saturday morning to visit this incredible organization.

Please note that if there ever was a time for us to get involved in providing food to those who would otherwise go hungry, *now is the time*. Results from a national study that included Massachusetts were just released in February, and the statistics are distressing. Below are key findings for eastern Massachusetts, and you can find these statistics and more at [www.gbfb.org/aboutHunger/HungerStudy.cfm](http://www.gbfb.org/aboutHunger/HungerStudy.cfm).

- 23% more people sought food assistance in 2009 than in 2005. More than 390,000 people sought assistance in 2009.
- About a third of the households receiving food assistance have at least one child under 18 years of age.
- Nearly a third say that their children are not eating enough because they can't afford enough food.
- Many of those interviewed had to make unacceptable choices:
  - 44% had to choose between food and heat.
  - 34% had to choose between food and rent.
  - 37% had to choose between food and medical care.
  - The study also shows that there is no one face of hunger.
  - 73% have a place to live.
  - More than a third of the households served have one or more working adults.
  - 44% of the clients are between 30 and 49 years old.
  - More than two-thirds are registered voters.
  - Poverty and food insecurity are linked:
  - About half of all households reported monthly incomes of less than \$800
  - 80% live below the federal poverty line (less than \$1,526 a month for a family of 3)

As I work with children at King’s Chapel, I want to reiterate one of the key findings that was not surprising to me: *Nearly a third say that their children are not eating enough because they can't afford enough food.* And, I want to add to this statistic a Spanish proverb that says, “The belly rules the mind.” If this is true, and I’ve had experiences where this has been true for me, then it logically follows that children whose bellies are ruling their minds have difficulty using their minds to concentrate on learning, playing, and other activities that are the hallmarks of childhood. Please, let’s do our part to help children be children again.
